- **SUPPORT THE DIGNITY FOR ALL STUDENTS ACT**

The Dignity for all Students Act Committee is requesting signatures on a letter to Senators in the New York State Senate, in support of S1987-A. S1987-A is a statewide legislation which requires schools to respect diversity and religion, train teachers and educate students, and to

report incidents of bias. Bureau of Justice Statistics and National Criminal Victimization Surveys (in 2001 and 2005) show that in New York State, children under the age of 17 are found to have committed the most hate crimes out of any other age category, accounting for a full 30% of violent hate offenses and 40% of property related hate offenses. 55% of teens have been harassed or assaulted during the past year because of their race, ethnicity, sex, disability, religion, appearance, or perceived or actual gender, sexual orientation, or gender expression.
